SHOWROOM CLASSES &WEIGHTS

Senior Bucks and Does-6 months of age and over, weight 7½ to 10½ pounds. Ideal weight 8½ pounds.

Junior Bucks and Does-Under 6 months of age, not over 7½ pounds. Minimum weight 3¾ pounds.

NOTE: Juniors exceeding maximum class weight may be shown in higher age classification. No animal may be shown in a lower age classification than its true age.

NOTE: Breed wool classes-White and Colored (Pointed Whites to be shown in White Wool.) The animal is judged on wool quality only.

GENERAL TYPE

BODY-Points 20: The body is to be medium length, with well filled hind-quarters. It is to be smooth and rounded, with good depth. Shoulders should be slightly narrower than the hips, forming a moderate taper. Top line is to show a gradual rise, starting behind the ears and reaching its highest point over the hips. The profile view from the side should be a definite oval shape. Looking down on the animal, it should present an oblong shape. Flesh is to be firm, over a well nourished body. Frame and bone are to be strong, sturdy, and of sufficient size to support the commercial type body.
